As she was lowering it reverently to the ground by a large oak, the chipmunk sprang from her hands and sat crouched on the ground. She came running in the house to ask me what to do. It was a cold and windy day. We found it in the same place and, without even thinking, my daughter reached down and scooped it up. The chipmunk made no attempt to escape and I'm sure you can imagine the pleading look that followed. We brought it in the house and that little chipmunk became the centerpiece of our family for the next two days.

I was sure it had died in my daughter's

hands. Wrong. I was sure that it would go wild and get lost in our house. Wrong. I was sure that it would bite one of us eventually. Wrong. That little chipmunk proved me wrong over and over again.

There are so many things I think I know. I make so many assumptions about people and their intentions. I convince myself I know exactly how a situation will play out and how a certain person will respond. Why do we do this? We people find security in a sense of knowing, so much so that we may cling to a false narrative just to have something to hold on to.

In following Christ we are called to empty ourselves of our knowing. We are called to make room for mystery and room for miracles. As we prepare for the coming of the Christ Light over the next few weeks, may we mindfully set aside what we think we know. Only then can we begin to really know one another; only then can we begin to fathom a love without limits and a life that never ends.

## MESSAGE FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR — Tom Martin

I thought I would share the music selection process I have been using since we entered COVID times. For preludes, I have selected compositions to allow for quiet outdoor conversations, as well as providing contemplative moments in preparation for services. Music of the Baroque period (1600-1750) and early Classical (1750-1820) period is perfect for this. Composers selected have included François Couperin (1668-1733), Jean-Philippe Rameau (1683-1764), Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750), George Frederick Handel (1685-1759), Carl Philipp Emmanuel Bach (1714-1788), and Josef Haydn (1732-1809).

For special music which replaces the anthem when there is no choir, I have been mostly using the Two-Part Inventions of Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). J. S. Bach was an extremely prolific composer as well as a very accomplished performer on viola and keyboards. During his lifetime, the available keyboards were harpsichord, clavichord, and organ, the piano having not yet been invented. If you scroll all the way to the bottom of the Heifer page you can get an overview of the amazing shopping experience you are invited to participate in. And thank you.

cellist. Jacob MacKay, one of our Summer Guest Artists Series performers, played selections from one of these. Bach's music is intricate and contemplative, yet seems to fit together in a deeply satisfying manner with cycles of consonance and dissonance.

For postludes, I have been playing some delightful sections of movements of W. A. Mozart's (1756-1791) for piano sonatas. His music sounds so simple, yet can be difficult to play. He was an extremely talented and very popular European touring musician. He was a prolific writer of very popular operas, symphonies, chamber music, sonatas for a variety of solo and combined instruments, along with a large body of sacred music. Imagine what enchanting compositions Mozart would have written had he lived past age 39!
