Over the past few weeks of traveling around Maine and New Hampshire, I have had a lot of time to consider what makes "vacation" enjoyable. Today, as I write from an unfamiliar laundromat in an unfamiliar town, I believe I have discovered what it is, at least for me. What makes my vacation enjoyable is not so much what I do, where I go, or how many peace-filled hours I can bank. What I enjoy the most is simply being in an unfamiliar landscape where more of my attention is required to do the mundane chores of my life, chores like laundry. When ordinary things have to be done in an extraordinary way, there is suddenly room for learning, for growing, for change.



We camped through some very wet and stormy weather on our trip this year. Drying out clothes and gear for 6 people with only the sun and the wind, as we continued to paddle, was not easy. Picture 2 fully loaded canoes with things draped on every available surface and tied down here and there to prevent being blown off and into another soaking in the lake. The challenge required creativity, persistence, constant adjusting and readjusting. Imagine the satisfaction, though, of returning things, crispy dry, back into waterproof bags.

At home it's so easy to just throw things into the washer and dryer without thinking twice about what I am doing or how I am doing it. My real gift of "vacation" has been recognizing that I feel so much more alert and alive when I'm out of my familiar routine. No, I am not making plans to put my washer and dryer out on the curb when I return home. We lived without either one for years; I know what that's like.

I do hope to return to my familiar places and routines with a deeper awareness about what brings me peace and a sense of well-being. I want to stay tuned to the extraordinary in the midst of the ordinary. I hope to remember that it is part of my walk with Christ to recognize "the things that make for peace" and then make the extra effort in my daily life to be open to change.

On that note, I must go now; my laundry is done.

Lovely red begonia plants given to each child graced the granite bench in memory of Albert and Mary Rajaniemi – a most fitting tribute to the man who for so many years was Superintendent of our Sunday School.

The "Together We Rise" prayer flag that many children crafted at the Garden Fest event held in May blew gently in the background, providing the perfect sentiment for the day.

Early in the summer I felt great hope in moving all of our Sunday School supplies from my basement into the beautiful North Room of the Community Center. But with the rising health statistics, opening up inperson Sunday School has given much pause. At this writing, one month from the traditional return of our



Sunday School on September 12, we feel it prudent to take a cautious approach.

Our families have been part of the discussion for several weeks, and have offered great input and support. The plan for now is to have our children come in person one Sunday a month. This monthly schedule will provide the congregation a chance to be with our children, and it will give our children the much-needed sense of church family.

Our recorded weekly Sunday School lessons will continue indefinitely, so on the Sundays we meet in person it will be more of a fun, project-oriented time with the kids as their lessons can be accessed from home. We ask that everyone be masked; the new space allows for plenty of physical distancing. It is a step toward whatever normal will look like in the future. Together we will rise!

#### MESSAGE FROM THE TRUSTEES — Rosamond Cady

The pandemic showed us how effective online meetings can be. Business can be taken care of even when we are on a break! At the start of July, with the world seemingly opening up at warp speed, the Board of Trustees, which oversees employees, faced the question of required vaccination for our staff employees.

It was decided that all staff working inside the church building would be required to be vaccinated; if a staff member declined vaccination, and it was applicable to the job, working exclusively outside of the building was allowed. All but one of our staff workers are fully vaccinated; that employee works entirely outside of the church building.

Woody Stockwell has taken over as our videographer each Sunday morning and is doing a great job. Because live-streaming our worship services will go on indefinitely, this is an important permanent position. In the middle of August, the Trustees voted to give the green light for Charles Works of Peterborough to create a new website for the Church. Council representatives,

as well as Phil Gammons and Frank Rizzo, met in late June to create a Wish List of what each board envisioned a revitalized site could look like. A survey was distributed to congregants on 7/4 and 7/11.

Data from both the Council Meeting and the survey was sent to Charles Works, after which Phil Gammons, June Brening, Ellen Bingham, and Yummy Cady met with them for a lengthy working session. Charles Works subsequently sent us a detailed project scope to develop

a new website for DCC, the expenditure of which was approved by the Trustees.

Soon we will be able to do and see all kinds of wonderful new things on our site — a new way for the world to see that the Dublin Community Church is a vibrant, relevant, caring, generous, Spirit-driven faith community — the place to be!
