Building

Navigating the seasonal demands of New England is no small feat. Already, more mornings than not, I am building a fire in the woodstove. It seems early to already be building fires and turning on the heat, doesn't it?



I'm so careful in how I build the fire in the mornings. I tear up the birchbark and build around it with the right sizes of kindling to ensure a successful start to my fire; I do not always succeed. Sometimes I have to begin again.

We have no choice but to respond to our environment, especially in these northern latitudes. I like to think that, in a deeper sense, it keeps us connected to the earth. It is a practice, of sorts. We gather the woolens, the down coats, and the sensible footwear that will see us safely and more comfortably through the winter temperatures. We nurture friendships, too, that will see us through the ups and downs of our lives.

Whether with fires or with Friendships, one must take great care in beginning and

in building. On a weekly basis I see instances of care and compassion being expressed among us. Together we are building something. Together we are learning how to be better neighbors, better Friends, and better family. Together we are learning how to nurture one another.

In this Autumn season we are invited to nurture the church, too, and all it represents, with our gifts of time and attention, and with our tithes and offerings. This year's pledge campaign theme is "Won't you be my Neighbor?" That is such a beautiful question and I think it will light a fire in our imaginations about what we are building together in this experiment we call the church. I thank you for being part of it all.

I am thrilled that our Board of Stewards is channeling the amazing Fred Rogers for our 2022 Pledge Campaign! Mr. Rogers has been my super-hero for 40 years - my constant partner in both parenting my two children, as well as in the faith formation of our Sunday School children.

Mr. Rogers obtained degrees in music, ministry, and child development. He was called to minister to children through the media of television, fighting all the way to Congress for effective programming laws to protect the youngest among us.

He set the benchmark for children's' television with his Mister Rogers' Neighborhood, which aired on public broadcasting from 1968 to 2001, providing a constant, safe space for millions of children – and their parents – to acknowledge their fears, their dreams, their ideas, their very souls. He assured them all that they were loved just the way they were.

Mr. Rogers is watching me right now from my refrigerator, holding the puppet, King Friday. I want to share four phrases of wisdom from Fred Rogers that I read frequently...also on my refrigerator!

- "It's our insides that make us who we are, that allow

us to dream and wonder and feel for others. That's what's essential. That's what will always make the biggest difference in our world."

continues to beat and that wants the best for every person. Anything that we can do to help foster the intellect and spirit and emotional growth of our fellow human beings, that is our job. Those of us who have this particular vision must continue against all odds. Life is for service."

MESSAGE FROM OUTREACH — Ellen Bingham

The church's immediate focus for donations is for the Ascentria Care Alliance (a nonprofit human-service organization based in Worcester, MA), which is currently bringing a refugee family to New Hampshire but is also about to resettle about 500 Afghans throughout Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

Successful arrival and rebuilding of lives is a long, slow, and challenging journey to navigate. Money is needed for all life necessities, especially housing (which is expensive and scarce) and legal fees.

Donations may be made anytime and directed to Ascentria, and a special collection will be taken at church on Sunday, November 14. MESSAGE FROM THE TRUSTEES — Rosamond Cady

Our Church has some very good news on the horizon, and it began with the Trustees – the board charged with the judicious oversight of our finances. The need for creating a new DCC website was first discussed in early Spring, and brought to the Trustees to see if it were fiscally possible; the Board felt it a good investment, pending the cost of such an endeavor.

A group including the Council and several other interested (and tech-minded) folks were asked to talk with their board members and research church websites to get a sense of what makes a website stand out. Armed with this framework of ideas, the group met for an inperson working meeting in late June. A very long Wish List was drawn up – things collectively envisioned a new site could be and how those dreams could best portray our amazing faith community to the world. Wanting to include the entire congregation for input, a short survey was distributed the first couple Sundays in July. All those great ideas were compiled and submitted to CharlesWorks, a web development company in Peterborough, for a cost estimate.

CharlesWorks sent us a proposal in mid-August, the Trustees approved the expenditure, and DCC was put into their work schedule. Many church voices have contributed to this project, creating a site that is truly "us." When the group received a peek of the site in early October, Ellen Bingham wrote, "Very, very, very exciting!! Looks like us. Feels like us. Nice job." By the time this *Good News* reaches your homes, our new website should be live — and we will all get to see amazing "us" in this exciting project.
