The Light of the World

In this New Year our days already have a few minutes more of daylight. Those daylight hours will be increasing, slowly at first and then quite rapidly, for the next six months. The promise of light answers an ancient need in us. Light conveys security, warmth, and possibility. Light, by its very nature, radiates out from its source in all directions simultaneously. The photons, the tiny mass-less particles that make up light, do not discriminate; they just move, quickly, at speeds of onehundred-eighty-six thousand miles each and every second. At that speed, we could circle the earth seven times in one second!



Light is not only fast, it is consistent and constant. Light photons never, ever, stop moving. Light goes forever and ever. Light is the perfect metaphor for the source of love we call God. And in my opinion and experience, Christ is the perfect metaphor for God. In Colossians 1, we find the following words: "Christ is the image of the invisible God. In him the fullness of God was pleased to dwell."

With the growing light of our days, Friends, may we search for the places within ourselves where God is "pleased to dwell." These places are the places where light overcomes our darkness. Sometimes the light is just a flicker, sometimes a flame, and sometimes a roaring fire. May we look for the light in others, especially those who differ from ourselves, and may we allow our own light to be seen in all we say and in all we do.

This is, after all, what Jesus asked us to do, according to Matthew 5: 14-16: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others..."

MESSAGE FROM CHRISTIAN EDUCATION - Rosamond Cady

As you read this "good news," our children will have already taken the journey to Bethlehem through the four weeks of Advent, where they prepared their hearts and minds for the arrival of the blessed Christ Child.

Was this trip the one we had anticipated a year ago? Absolutely not. But through all the many changes we all have had to make in every single aspect of our lives, our church has been laser-focused on one thing: keeping our children somehow connected to their faith community.

All information received for the past 21 months boils down to this: "it is not advised to meet in-person with children at this time." That seems counterintuitive to all other events children are engaged in, but our church has taken the pandemic very seriously. And has taken the task of involving our church families as much as humanly possible even more seriously.

For the four Sundays of Advent, as adults gathered in the sanctuary and the service Zoomed to many, two of our families participated each of those weeks. One of our older children called us to worship and read the sacred texts, while another family lit the Advent Wreath candles, read scripture and offered prayer. All families were invited to decorate the beautiful tree gracing the front portico of the church on December 4 - a gift of Love and Hope and Light to the entire community. The church sent each family an Advent Calendar – in every box a piece of the Christmas Story instead of a piece of chocolate. And every week a



Sunday School Lesson is posted on our website for families to "attend" at their leisure; during Advent, we lit our own Advent Wreaths virtually.

We won't know for many years – as these pandemic children grow into adulthood – whether our efforts to connect them to meaningful faith formation succeeded. But we do know that we tried with all our hearts to make our kids feel loved – by all of us, and by God. Let us enter the New Year with the tenets of Advent in our hearts: Hope, Peace, Joy and Love.

One of the joys of hiring Traceymay was the process that brought together members of the Dublin and the Harrisville & Chesham Churches as a joint search committee. Tim Clark's death reminded me how much that fellowship means to me; and that we have the opportunity to revive and sustain it.

I propose a meeting, which could become a series of meetings if we wish, to be held at the Dublin Community Church, with Zoom attendance possible, to consider a subject which I've been studying this fall at the Boston University School of Theology: science. Our professor has taken us through a wide range of topics in physics, chemistry and biology, challenging us to create five- minute presentations for an audience of our choosing that communicate some aspect of the topic clearly and accurately.

I have been learning about cosmology (the Big Bang), relativity (special and general theories), quantum

mechanics, now genetics, epigenetics, and evolution. I would like to choose one of these topics, probably from the beginning of the course; offer you some short videos to watch before we meet; share my five-minute presentation with you as part of a mini-lecture; then share our reactions and questions.

If this is fun and something you'd like to continue, we can do that, either with me taking the lead again or with one of you choosing a topic you'd like to research and present. But one step at a time!

I propose **Wednesday, January 19**, as our trial run, probably from 3 - 4 or from 5 - 6. A small number of us may be able to meet in person in the Dublin Community Church (depending on the state of COVID) while others can join by Zoom if you prefer.

I offer this in the spirit of curiosity and fun that the memory of Tim embodies for me.
